This document specifies the level of support provided by Microsoft Office Outlook 2007 and Microsoft Outlook 2010 for the Post Office Protocol version 3 (POP3), as specified in [RFC1939]. Outlook uses the POP3 protocol to retrieve messages from the server.

2 Support Details

The use of the words "Required," "Recommended," and "Optional" in the titles of the sections below are to be interpreted as specified in [RFC2119].

2.1 Required Portions

Outlook's implementation of POP3 adheres to all of the required portions of [RFC1939].

2.2 Recommended Portions

Outlook's implementation of POP3 adheres to all of the recommended portions of [RFC1939].

2.3 Optional Portions

Outlook's implementation of POP3 adheres to all of the optional portions of [RFC1939], except for the following deviations.

2.3.1 RFC Section: 4. The AUTHORIZATION State

Outlook supports the USER and PASS commands, as specified in [RFC1939], and the authentication mechanisms specified in [RFC1734]. By supporting [RFC1734], Outlook also supports Digest-MD5 and NT LAN Manager (NTLM) authentication. Outlook does not support the APOP command.

2.3.2 RFC Section: 7. APOP Command.

Outlook does not support the APOP command.

POP3 extensions to [RFC1939] are as specified in [MS-OXPOP3].
